What is the Pupil Premium?

Whilst ability can be said to know no social-economic limitations, unfortunately the same cannot be said for attainment. Poverty, nationally, defines outcomes and social class is the strongest predictor of educational outcomes. Happily, this is not the case at BDA.

The 'Pupil Premium' is a grant given to schools for each child who currently claims free school meals or who has done so within the past six years.

It is really important that all parents/carers of children eligible to do so register for free school meals, even if they don't choose to have them, as the grant enables us to provide extra resources for our disadvantaged pupils.

Research has shown that children who have been, on or are on Free School Meals (FSM) do not attain as highly as other children in school. The government provides this grant so that we can commission and allocate additional support to ensure that they do. The support can be in a short burst or over a longer period of time such as a term, two terms, a year or more. It may take the form of 1-1 or small group teaching and may be an evidence-based intervention. It can be additional resources, enrichment or access to opportunities that enhance learning and or aspiration.

Following a fact-finding visit to the academy, the Department for Education contacted the Principal of Ark Burlington Danes in February 2011 stating that the academy has '*proven success in raising the attainment of pupils eligible for free school meals...*'

The Pupil Premium at Burlington Danes Academy

Ark Burlington Danes Academy supports the government belief that the Pupil Premium, an additional sum to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for FSM and their wealthier peers.

Funding is based on the financial year rather than the academic year so the 2015/16 school budget consists of 7 months financial year 15/16 and 5 months financial year 16/17. The total national funding through the Premium increased from £625m in 2011-12 to £1.25bn in 2012-13. The total national funding through the Premium has increased from £625m in 2011-12 to £1.25bn in 2012-13 and £1.875bn in 2013-14. The level of the premium in 2011-12 was £488 per pupil for Ever 6 FSM pupils (and for pupils in care who have been continuously looked after for six months). It increased to £623 per pupil in 2012-13. The government has increased this further in 2014-15 to £935 per pupil. It remains at this figure for 2015-16.

Across the financial year of 2013-14, the school received £517,000. Across the financial year of 2014-15, Burlington Danes Academy received £554,000. In

the financial year 2015-16 Burlington Danes Academy expects to receive £551,000 through the pupil premium. We are confident that we will spend well over half a million pounds on specific interventions of which most are directly targeted at students on FSM+6 or CLA. The impact this expenditure had on 'pupil premium' pupils' progress and attainment is analysed later on in this document.

We have 590 students on FSM+6. Out of the total roll of 890 students (in Y7 -11) this means 66.3% of our roll are PP funded. The national average is 16.3%.

With a Pupil Premium figure of 66% it is almost impossible to target PP pupils separately. Additionally, we are aware of the postcode and other contextual deprivation indicators: the large majority of the rest of our students are not significantly better off or less deprived. Therefore we target many interventions following data analysis on the basis of achievement and tackle low literacy and attainment as opposed to pupil premium. However we do monitor Pupil Premium students separately so that we can be sure that these pupils make the required progress in particular.

- The majority of students at Burlington Danes Academy qualify for Pupil Premium funding. The average PP measure for Yr 7-11 at Ark Burlington Danes is 66.3%.
- The attainment gap is widest in mathematics where in Y8-Y11 the gap is larger than 0.5 sub-levels for each year group.
- Pupil Premium pupils are making more progress in English. The gap is closest in years 7, 9 and 10.
- Pupil Premium pupils are making most comparative progress in year 9.
- The attainment gap is widest with Year 8 pupils in both English and maths.
- PP pupils in maths need monitoring and intervention in ensure the most vulnerable pupils make expected progress.

- The attainment headline figures at GCSE show a 5% attainment gap between Pupil Premium and all students, (3% for 2014 and 7% in 2013, so the gap has widened slightly).
- Pupil Premium Pupils achieved 55% A*-C including English and maths. The national average is 37.9%. This is a difference is of 15.3%.
- PP pupils performed less well than non PP pupils. The difference is 18%. This is narrower than the national average attainment gap of around 23% between FSM/CLA and non FSM/CLA.

- Y11 has the most pupils PP SEN students.
- The groups used for these figures are significantly small which makes drawing comparisons and conclusions about the attainment gap difficult. For example, in Y9 there is only one student who is non-PP SEN.
- PP SEN pupils are making more progress in English than maths.
- The attainment gap is widest with Y10 students in English. This needs intervention in order to ensure they make expected academy progress as they go into Y11.
