FUTURE SUCCESS CAREERS EVENT AT BDA

Before the half term break, we hosted another successful event that was designed to help our Sixth Form students gain an insight as well as guidance into the professional world.

Future Success has now been established for 4 years and each year we have invited various professional bodies to visit the academy and offer assistance to sixth form students when deciding what options to choose after A-Levels.

With over 200 candidates in our Years 12 and 13 cohort, the event proved to be a yet another successful affair for students to explore whether they continue with further education, apply for apprenticeships or venture straight into employment.

There were over 20 different stalls set up to highlight the various prospects available. Companies such as the BBC, KPMG and LSBM offered School Leaver Programmes for high achieving students, with an option to do a degree program or an apprenticeship, designed to eliminate paying fees required for a degree.

This would be a fantastic opportunity for any student looking to train within a chosen career path as well as getting paid for it!

There were also inspirational talks from universities, such as Imperial College who talked about effective ways to write a successful personal statement. Apprenticeship speakers such as former student, Mo Sharif, spoke about his experience working in an accountancy firm, and there were also work experience speakers from Whitbread















It was quite clear to see that this was a fantastic opportunity for a young adult, as well as the sense of pride she felt in achieving this competitive position at Mediacom.

YEAR 12 ENGLISH RESIDENTIAL TRIP TO HAWORTH

On Friday the 6th of February our A level English students went forth to visit the glacial regions of Yorkshire in hope to encounter the legendary moors in order to enhance their understanding of Emily Bronte's novel 'Wuthering Heights' for their coursework. Within the two days, they were given a chance to listen to two lectures on the novel's analytical characteristics as well as its raw background. They also visited the Bronte's museum and climbed the hilly landscape which Yorkshire had to offer.

The day began with a tour around the delightful petite village which was skilfully adapted its environment. to primordial buildings stand side by side to newer and more modern shops and house as though it was the norm. It was a refreshing sight as it was something abnormal and unfeasible to us as we could not look beyond the silvery skyscrapers back home. The trip to her museum helped paint a vivid picture of her own personal life as well as keeping an element of mystery which remains to be Perhaps her own lifestyle was solved. mirrored through the lives of the very characters in her novel. All in all, our understanding of Wuthering Heights will continue to be expanded.

Despite the excitement the experience that stood out was the opportunity to visit the scarce landscapes that laid the foundation for the novel and moulded Emily's very character. The moors were eternal. Land after land was all that was on show. Yet, you were conscious of the fact that you were miles away from another soul. Perhaps was the very environment that this enlightened Emily as her own solitude proved to be enough. The moors stood as a barrier between her and the misfortunate and distressing truth that lingered. Since the moors are empty, they are free from imperfection thus free from judgment and expectation. Free from social standards. All in all, they are refreshing.
